

8 Valuable Truths

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1. God will cleanse our sins completely

In the New Covenant

God promises **not to remember our sins any more**
(Hebrews 8:12),

instead of just **covering** them up (Psalm 32:1)

2. God gives us the power to do His Will

In the New Covenant

we have the **power** to do God's Will (Hebrews 10:7)

and not just the **desire** (Psalm 40:8)

3. Allow God to break you

The Israelites were enslaved in Egypt for 430 years (Exodus 12:40),

even though God had planned for them to be there only for 400 years (Genesis 15:13).

This was because it took God 40 years to **break** Moses (Acts 7:30), when it should have taken only 10 years.

4. Lying is a very serious sin

The first sin mentioned in the Bible is **lying** (Genesis 3:4),

The first sin mentioned after the day of Pentecost is **lying** (Acts 5:2-3).

The last sin mentioned in the Bible is **lying** (Revelation 22:15)

5. The fear of the Lord is the beginning

Job was the first book of the Bible, because he lived 500 years before Moses (who wrote Genesis).

This teaches us that the first thing God wanted to tell man was not how the world was created but that He was looking for men who **feared Him** and who **turned away from all evil - like Job did** (Job 1:1, 8)

6. There is a gate and a way that leads to life

Eternal life is a life that has no beginning and no end. Only God has that life (John 17:3).

We enter into eternal life by first entering through the **narrow gate** in a moment (Matthew 7:13) and then walking the **narrow way of daily death to Self that leads to eternal life** (Matthew 7:13-14).

7. Lust and anger will lead you to hell

The two sins that Jesus specifically stated would lead us to hell are:

- **persistent anger** (Matthew 5:22)
- and **sexually lusting after women** (Matthew 5:29-30).

8. Seek for the Continually Filling of the Holy Spirit

Jesus normally didn't raise His voice (Matthew 12:19), but when He did, it was to call out the thirsty to come and be **filled** with the Holy Spirit (John 7:38).

The disciples received the Holy Spirit on the day of Jesus' resurrection (John 20:22). But they still needed to be filled on the day of Pentecost (Acts 1:4) and **continually** thereafter.
